I was a member of the Transitional Housing for Young Probationers and High-Risk Youth and now a staff of the 7-Eleven store at Youth Outreach. I am a just a normal person.

My mum passed away three years ago after a long illness. I was sent to a hostel because of my bad behavior and my family could not take care of me anymore. The hostel I stayed had many rules such as no cellphone use and no going out and many duties were assigned to me from time to time. There were many rules to follow even for mealtime! I felt very restrained and unfair as I still could not make my own choices given, I was eighteen years old already. The hostel treated me like a kid and took care of everything except my urine and stool. I did not like the hostel.

I always needed to go to hospital for follow-up consultation as there was something wrong with my body. I repeatedly escaped from the hostel whenever I went to follow-up appointment but then was brought back by the staff. The hostel thought that they were unable to contain me, and I told them I wanted to go to Youth Outreach because my friends said Youth Outreach is good and the staff there will let me go out. Unlike the previous hostel where I could not use cell phone and watch television, Youth Outreach is a "heaven" for me where I wanted to stay and could regain my freedom. Therefore, the hostel wrote me a referral letter and I was assigned to Youth Outreach by the Court.

After residing at Transitional Housing for Young Probationers and High-Risk Youth, I felt more free. Unlike other hostels which will strictly look after me due to my court order, Youth Outreach will let me live freely and choose when to go out. Sometimes I could read my books longer before sleep, but in previous hostel I was required to sleep at 9 p.m. and shower at a designated time so I could not do a lot of things under strict supervision. In Youth Outreach, I think people comparatively respect my thoughts and I feel much better. Sometimes when I was a in a bad mood, I could find people to talk to and it was okay to have a big cry as the staff are willing to console me. There were times that I treated people badly and had a quarrel with my social worker, but they would use alternative ways to communicate with me such as writing me a card and put it in my locker. When I read the card, it made my heart melt.

I have a younger sister and brother and my dad has a new family after my mum passed away. As my siblings could not live with my dad, they have no parents and become orphans. They were sent to live in hostels with strict rules and cannot always go out. Due to the pandemic, I cannot go visit them. As my sister has a cellphone, I can still reach her by phone. However, my brother does not have one and I can only call the hostel to find him. Haven't seen him for a long time, I do not know what he looks like now as his voice has changed, maybe they both forget my appearance too.

My worse memory is studying at school because I did not know how to communicate with others, thus I always get bullied. When I first entered Youth Outreach, I did not study nor work. I felt I am not a studious person as I either slept or played with my phone during class and always failed exams. I like to draw and therefore I switched to study illustration sponsored by Youth Outreach and eventually got a certificate. Someone wanted to hire me when I was still studying but I felt the things they wanted me to draw are too childish, so I rejected. I then began to sell things in street markets, but I still felt I am so far behind.

I know I need a full-time job to maintain a living. My first job is being a waiter but then I quit after a week as I found I did not have the stamina to move things around. Transitional Housing for Young Probationers and High-Risk Youth then referred me to the 7-Eleven store on the ground floor of Youth Outreach. I have been working there for two and a half years and the store manger, Ling, and colleagues are very nice. One time, I accidentally put \$2,000 into the garbage can which is closed to the cashier. After checking the CCTV, I misplaced the money and the garbage had already been sent to the refuse collection point. Ling generously helped me to pay first and I paid her back gradually. If this is another 7-Eleven store, I might possibly be fired right away. When I was sick, Ling would take care of me like a mother and helped me to pay to see doctor. I told her she should adopt me as her daughter, but she said she possibly could not have such a big daughter nevertheless I felt very heart-warming. In 7-Eleven, I need to arrange goods in order and serve customers, thus my hygiene and communication skills are getting better, and I am more confident that I can take care of myself.

Staff of Youth Outreach helped plan for my future and saved a sum of money so I could able to maintain my living after leaving transitional housing. I did not know there is a co-living hostel until Youth Outreach helped me find it. They helped me to find places to stay while communicating with different hostels to expedite my application. They are really hard working and more attentive to this matter than me which I think I could do more.

I am now living in a co-living hostel and work at the 7-Eleven store at Youth Outreach. In my spare time, I draw cosplay sell things at street market and keep finding my dreams.
